## A comment from the Dairy Flat Community Liaison Chairman

### Dear Readers,

Due to COVID-19, this is our second newsletter of the year ... we normally produce four per annum. Since the February newsletter, we have been through Lockdown Levels 4 to 1 and drought has given way to water tanks which are fuller or even overflowing.

I trust the forced lockdown allowed all of you to think outside the box and contemplate what the new normal will look like, once we get back to Level 0. I have used Zoom, WhatsApp, Jami and Skype to have meetings but, unlike most of the world, we have moved rapidly from level 4 to Level 1 and the last Community Liaison Committee meeting (CLC) was held when we were already in Level 1 and it was like business as usual. Regarding the CLC, our main function is to meet quarterly and interact with Waste Management as to how the landfill is operating and specifically review any breaches/potential breaches and the remediation that has taken place. Breaches mainly occur around odour, noise, dust and pests and Waste Management welcomes all readers to contact them with issues specifically related to these matters.

Committee members were appraised about how the landfill has been operating under "lockdown" conditions and of specific note is that during Levels 4, 3 and 2, staff performed this essential service with emphasis on social distancing and ensuring protective clothing was being used and sanitizer was used liberally, too. The amount of waste generated reduced substantially with no corporate building/renovations taking place during lockdown, meaning the fill had to strategize around how they took in the reduced fill, cap it off, etc. Management has also indicated an increased number of seagulls returning to the site as some of their other sources of food reduced (no scraps from fishermen and beach picnics). To control the seagulls, sporadic noise (blank shot gun shells are fired) were used to scare them off.

Linking back to our bubbles and thinking outside the box, a petition was started about three months ago to improve broadband access in the Dairy Flat/Coatesville areas of Rodney ... if you have not signed it yet, please do ... the link is <a href="https://www.change.org/p/central-government-upgrade-failing-broadband-infrastructure-in-dairy-flat-and-coatesville">https://www.change.org/p/central-government-upgrade-failing-broadband-infrastructure-in-dairy-flat-and-coatesville</a>. 806 people have signed so far (mid/late July) and more are needed! Looking at roading in our area, the roading project at the Coatesville/Dairy Flat Highway intersection closed when we went into Level 4 but recommenced when we went back to Level 3. I understand that the projected finish date has been extended due to additional stabilisation of the land at the intersection.

Another roading improvement mentioned in the last newsletter was that of improving driver visibility when exiting Dairy Flat Primary School and correspondence from AT indicating that car parks either side of the exit are to be removed and painted with yellow lines and indicating no stopping or parking 24 hours per day. The painting is supposed to be done before end of July this year.

You will also notice that as of the beginning of this month (July), many of our roads have also seen the lowering of speed limits, in some cases to 80 and in others, to 60kph.

The Dairy Flat Hall was the venue for the inaugural meeting of the Dairy Flat Residents and Ratepayers Association in the latter part of 2019. The next meeting was planned for February/March and a draft constitution along with a facilitator to help interested parties work through the processes didn't take place and no new date has been suggested yet.

I urge all readers to support local businesses and other local activities and especially those that advertise via this newsletter...they rely on us using their services and with lost revenue brought about by lockdown, they need our help more than ever.



### An update from Louise Johnston

As our lives are slowly going back to normal, Auckland Council are still in the process of finalizing the Emergency Budget. Even with the 3.5 % rate increase there are still some very unwelcome cuts including the deferral of both road sealing monies and the AT Local Board Transport Capital Fund. Monies from this fund had been earmarked for the road safety improvements and foot path outside of Dairy Flat Primary School. The preliminary design had been completed for this project and discussed with the school. For it to be delayed is unacceptable. AT are spending millions on safety improvements along Dairy Flat Highway (DFH). To not ensure the safety of our primary school kids that are forced to walk along DFH after school because of insufficient school parking is just too much of a risk and this project needs to get the go ahead in 2020.

Below are another couple of updates for our community:

### Green Road and our future park

The draft master plan for our future park at Green Road is now out for public feedback. This 154 Hectare future park will in a couple of decades be surrounded by dense urban housing. It is estimated that within the future urban zone of just Dairy Flat there will be 25.500 new dwellings and over 69,000 residents. The future urban land is scheduled to be development ready by 2033-2038. While we are very lucky to be surrounded by green Space in Dairy Flat, future generations will not have this luxury and it is so important that we protect this Green open space for our children to enjoy. Council can simply not afford to purchase large blocks of land for parks like Green Road and I do believe this park has the potential to be the Cornwall Park of the North Shore. A kiwi version of a Great English Park. There is going to be mounting pressure in the years to come for libraries, hospitals, community centers and schools to be located on this land but if we can protect this open space for future generations to enjoy then I truly believe this is a job well done!

Within the draft plan we have tried to ensure that the park keeps the rural character, and that within the short term it is opened up for public access with trails for walking, mountain biking and horse-riding and that tree planting and landscaping can start.

### Supporting Growth's future transport projects:

In late May, I received information from the Supporting Growth team on the future transport projects in Dairy Flat, Orewa, Wainui and Silverdale. For those of you who may not be aware, the supporting growth team are a collaboration between Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency, Auckland Transport and Council. This project is planning the transport networks now to support the almost million new people who will call Auckland home in the next 30 years. It's a big job to plan for this massive growth, long before new houses and communities are built, but I'm glad to see that planning is underway as often infrastructure comes after growth (e.g. SH 16 and Kumeu).

I recently met with the supporting growth team to better understand these future projects and how this will impact locals. I was excited to hear that a variety of transport options such as public transport, walking and cycling paths and road upgrades are being considered for the next 10, 20 and 30 years. This will give our future communities different options to choose from when travelling between home, work and leisure activities. The projects being planned for include:

• a new rapid public transport corridor from Albany to Milldale, through the future growth area at Dairy Flat

- upgrades to SH1 between Albany and Silverdale
- new walking and cycling paths along SH1 and the new rapid public transport corridor
- new SH1 interchanges at Redvale (Penlink) and at Wilks Road, and an upgrade to the existing Silverdale interchange.

A few locals have contacted me understandably concerned their property is within the study area of these projects and how this will impact their property or property value. I spoke to the team about this and they assured me that if a property is within a study area it does not necessarily mean that the property will be impacted. As I understand it, the supporting growth team is carrying out investigations to understand the area and develop route options for these projects. They will be asking for our feedback on these options later this year. Once they have their preferred routes, they will discuss the impacts with property owners, if any, from mid next year. This is a very uncertain time for property owners and there is often misinformation around this process.

I will keep in touch with the Supporting Growth team as the planning for these projects progresses and will keep you up to date. ### Roundabout construction at Coatesville Riverhead and Dairy Flat Highway

The construction team are currently working on the retaining wall adjacent to the temporary roundabout. This temporary roundabout will be operational for around 6 weeks. Many residents have asked how much this is all costing and the short answer is around \$ 11 million. This is not just the contractors construction costs but includes all other costs such as MSQA (management, surveillance and quality assurance) costs by AT staff and consultants, service relocation by Vector & Chorus, arboriculturally monitoring, lizard monitoring, and additional investigation/design work due to unforeseen circumstances (e.g. ground conditions) resulting in the need for some redesign.

### New Speed limits reductions

The new speed limit reductions in our area that came into force at the end of June have been generally well received apart from Coatesville Riverhead Highway which continues to be contentious. There will be a second tranche of speed limit reductions later in the year. At this stage I do not know what roads within our area will be subject to review.

### Request for better broadband infrastructure

Following the presentation of our 800 signature Petition to parliament requesting that our failing internet infrastructure be upgraded. I have received the following update. "The select committee are still working on the petition and have sought written evidence from MBIE and Crown Infrastructure Partners. Unfortunately, they are unlikely to receive that evidence before the committee's last meeting before the election. When committees start meeting again after the election, we'll update you on any further progress."

The Coatesville Community are currently working on community led solution for rolling out Fibre to the Coatesville Community. This is being partly funded by the Community (300K), Crown Infrastructure partners and Chorus. If this is successful there maybe opportunities for other communities to do the same and this is something that Dairy Flat could possibility investigate as well.
