Redvale Landfill

Hi from the team at Waste Management,

To introduce myself I'm Blair Macfarlane, the new Regional Manager for Redvale Landfill and Energy Park. I've been with the team here at Redvale for nearly two months now. I'm am enjoying getting to grips with the technicalities of the Waste Management sector, my previous management and civil construction experience has been with Downer and most recently with Allied Concrete in Wellington, Auckland and Northland. I'm very impressed with our site here, it is far away from my memories of the sights and smells of a 1980's tip that I used to visit with my Dad once a month as a kid. We've come a long way.

The Redvale operation is busy at the moment. November was a record month here with over 90,000 tonnes of general waste and soils coming to site. Our Construction team have been hard at work readying our new cell and tip pad as the first part of the current cell 19b nears capacity into the third week of December.

Regional projects are still contributing a high volume of soils into our site, including the Puhoi to Warkworth, Northern Corridor, City Rail Link, Milford Marina dredging, and multiple housing developments around the North Shore/Albany/Millwater area.

Our Redvale Energy Park has also seen a lot of activity in the past two months. Mid November we achieved the commissioning of our latest Gas Generators G13 and G14. These will take our energy generation capacity to that sufficient to power 14,000 homes on the local grid. I personally find this aspect of our operation amazing, in that we are drawing 36 million cubic metres of the 'greenhouse gas' methane out of the landfill each year and turn that into clean green energy, rather than letting it contribute to climate change. Awesome.

We still have several vacancies in our Operations, Gas Technical, Mechanical and Site Maintenance teams here on site, so if you or anyone you know would like to consider joining us, feel free to drop by or phone Stephanie at Reception, 09 427 0600.

Dairy Flat Vet Hospital

Make this Christmas a merry one for you and your animals – both large and small!

You'll be more relaxed on your holiday if you take a few simple steps to ensure your animals will be enjoying the summer weather too. Before going away check around your property and fix any fences that need patching or gates that require a quick re-enforcement. Dogs are great escape artists so find ways of keeping them contained on your property if leaving them at home...you won't want the neighbour complaining that they've worried their stock.

Ask someone to check on your animals daily or even better, get a house sitter. Animals can get up to all sorts of mischief so keeping tabs on them can mean problems can be sorted quickly with the least amount of fuss. This could also allow you to leave your cats and dogs at home in comfort. Watch out for stray chocolate or Christmas off-cuts such as ham or onions. All of these will make dogs sick and need veterinary attention.

We all like to have a cold drink to cool off so check your water levels in the paddocks. Don't have a trough? Farm suppliers have troughs that can be installed that will self-regulate the water level, so no more getting out the hose every day to fill buckets for thirsty animals.

How much grass do you have? Sheep need a minimum of 5cm of grass height to take in enough food during the day – this is just above the red band on RedBand gumboots. Cattle need 10cm to be able to wrap their tongue around the grass and pull it up. Stock up on hay or pellets to feed out if there is a drought.

Is there shade around? Remember that animals get just as hot as we do and a shaded area reduces stress on scorching days. Even a tarpaulin sheltering a corner can be helpful. Think about planting trees in autumn if you find your animals seeking shelter from fence lines or shrubs.

Lots of chooks? Find yourself a chook feeder. Chickens learn to use these very quickly and if you get a feeder large enough it will last your chooks a few days before they'll need a refill.

We hate being bothered by flies and it's no different for our animals. Book your shearer if needed and apply fly repellent to your animals once shorn or before leaving home.

With a bit of attention here and there your animals will enjoy the silly season just as much as we do. Merry Christmas from Dairy Flat Vets

Free range vs battery hen eggs

Last week we saved ten little 18 month old battery-chooks from certain death to KFC. Rest assured, they will be loved whether laying or not. These hens didn't know what it was like to be outside in the wind, to feel the sun, to scratch in the dirt for worms or what is was like to eat real food and salad scraps. They're going to be 'transformed' within 12 weeks! The good news is that they are already laying!

You can quickly see if you have cooked a real free range egg by the rich, bright yellow, almost orange yolk. On average, free range eggs have twice as much omega-3 fatty acids, three times more vitamin E, up to six times more vitamin D, higher in B-group vitamins and are rich in two powerful antioxidants, lutein and zeaxanthin - important for eye health. <u>Update from Louise Johnston: Rodney Local Board</u>

Last month it was great to see Auckland Transport (AT) finally announce the Dairy Flat Highway (DFH) Safety improvements including the new roundabout and other intersection upgrades. Given that there have been nine deaths and 55 serious injuries between 2008 and 2017 along DFH these changes are long overdue. I just really hope that AT do not have any further delays and are able to meet the proposed start dates for these projects. The roundabout at intersection of DFH and Coatesville Riverhead Highway is now scheduled to start construction in March 2019 and the speed limit reduction of DFH is scheduled for this month.

As you may have read in the news, AT are reviewing the speed limits across Auckland via a review of the speed limit bylaws. This review was supposed to come out for public consultation this month but it has been delayed by the AT board. There is a strong opposition in Central Auckland to speed limits being reduced but in Rodney we don't have the luxury of footpaths, street lights, we have 80 km/hr. to 100km/hr. speed limits and the geometry of some of our roads makes these speeds simply unsafe. I was pleasantly surprised about the number of roads in Coatesville and Dairy Flat included in this review. I just hope this project is not further delayed because of opposition in Central Auckland. The new date for public consultation is now Feb – Mar 2019.

Many residents provided feedback at the start of the year on the background report for the new business area in Silverdale and Dairy Flat. Following on from this, a draft structure plan for this area is due out for public consultation in early 2019. This plan will include the proposed land use, transport, water, wastewater and storm water infrastructure requirements, a staging plan, and the infrastructure costs, along with other information. Council will be holding consultation events early in 2019 to help inform you about the structure plan. I think it is very important that local residents provide feedback on this draft structure plan to ensure that the new area is desirable to live next door to. The planning of the future 154 Hectare park at Green Road is progressing well. Council will formally present to the Local Board the needs assessment next week which will be sent out to everyone that provided feedback online. This report will identify the type of activities that will be included in the new park. The next step is for council to complete an Open Space Management plan which will identify where the activities will go and the layout etc. A big thank you to everybody that provided feedback. There are some clear themes coming through including the need to maintain the rural nature of the park similar to Cornwall Park in Auckland and Richmond Park in London.

Lastly, the new urban development at Milldale, Wainui has been accelerated (9000 houses). This is a result of a new partnership between Crown Infrastructure partners, Council and Fulton Hogan. My concern with this accelerated growth is that there are no firm plans for public transport for this area. There is already a shortage of carparks at the Silverdale Park N Ride and there are no significant plans in the next 10 years for more spaces. AT have said that they will provide feeder buses but could not say when these would be provided and the frequency. Would it be after the first 1000 houses or more? I think it naive to assume that residents of the new Milldale development will work locally especially given that the new business area in Dairy Flat is still a long way off. So while the Government and Council have ticked a box to provide more houses we will all feel the effects with more cars on the road.

After a busy year I am sure everybody is looking forward to a relaxing break. Please have a Merry Christmas and a Happy Holiday.
