A comment from the Dairy Flat Community Liaison Chairman

This is my first Dairy Flat Newsletter for 2020 and despite the driest January in 72 years in the Auckland area, I do hope that 2020 finds you well.

Looking at the last newsletter of last year, I mentioned in late November that the last few days, except for cooler evenings, had felt like summer and after about a week with no rain, people starting to say that they need rain.

Almost three months on, we desperately need rain...I understand the lead time to order in tanker water is now three to five weeks and that WaterCare water is being offered on a reduced basis at their Albany, Whangaparaoa and Helensville hydrants.

Focusing on our area, the roading projects are still ongoing, especially at the Coatesville/Dairy Flat Highway intersection.

To improve driver visibility when exiting Dairy Flat Primary School, I received AT correspondence today (Waitangi Day) indicating that car parks either side of the exit are to be removed and painted with yellow lines and indicating no stopping or parking 24 hours per day. The painting is to be done before end of July this year.

The Dairy Flat Hall was the venue for the inaugural meeting of the Dairy Flat Residents and Ratepayers Association in the latter part of 2019. The next meeting has been earmarked for February/March and a draft constitution along with a facilitator should help interested parties through the processes we need to consider and adopt.

Above, I have mentioned water tankers/WaterCare, Dairy Flat Primary School, Dairy Flat Hall, Dairy Flat Residents and Ratepayers Association and going further, I urge all readers to support local businesses and other local activities and especially those that advertise via this newsletter...they rely on us using their services.

Lastly, an initiative to control mynah birds at the landfill commenced in the last quarter of 2019 and by year end, more than 300 birds had been humanely destroyed, making a significant dent into this nuisance birds population. If you have nuisance pests in the area where you live and need advice on how to reduce or eradicate them entirely, please do contact the Council or DOC and also, consult the World Wide Web...initiatives now will help us to be predator free by 2050

A WORD ON WATERING

Happy New Year to you all!

Hot and dry to say the least! Everyone is starting to feel the strain, not to mention the plants. Fierce sun can mean sunburn all round, showing up as leaves burning in the middle and on the area most exposed to the sun. Remedy; choose a species suited to open exposed sites, Astelia banksii, Hebe, flax, Libertia, Pimelia, Coprosma etc.

Soil moisture is very low and plants are certainly starting to show signs of lack of water. Well mulched areas are considerably better off than areas of bare earth, which are badly cracked, areas with a good soft mulch layer are much better at absorbing any moisture offered them. Shade trees are certainly of great benefit.

Best time for watering is of course in the cool of the evening, but first thing in the morning also has its place. Plants that are subject to mildew such as courgettes are best watered in the morning so the moisture isn't sitting on the leaves all night creating an ideal environment for mildew. Watering in the middle of the day is the least effective, also make sure if using a sprinkler that the water is getting at the right places, i.e. not running off down a path into a drain.

A rough guide for shallow rooting plants, such as annuals and the vegie garden, is to water deeply three or so times a week, perhaps more if particularly dry and the plants are young. I've planted sunflowers in the vegie patch in the past to provide much needed summer shade, reducing water requirements and having the added bonus of sunflower seeds for me or if I'm to lazy to hull them the chooks, not to mention those that go to the local wild bird population, they also look great! Newly established trees and shrubs may need watering about once a week if they have been selected to suit existing conditions. Factors such as wind, sun, and soil type obviously need to be taken into consideration.

Don't forget to keep the bird bath clean and topped up with water. Birds do a tremendous amount of good in the garden, and there is little moisture about for them to drink, a piece of wood in the water trough can stop thirsty birds from drowning.

Keep on top of the weeds especially those that seed quickly; they will be the ones that flourish with the first bit of moisture.

Here's to some decent soaking rain!

Update from Louise Johnston

Please see below updates for the New Year:

Dairy Flat Highway Safety Project:

I have always been critical about Auckland Transport's (AT) communication and how they are very reactionary and ignore feedback from locals. However, I did think this was improving with the delivery of the Dairy Flat Highway (DFH) safety project. Therefore, I am extremely disappointed to find out that the new right-hand turning bay at the intersection of DFH and Green Road is no longer part of this project. At all the community feedback sessions, locals expressed their safety concerns about this intersection and felt it was a high priority. As a local, I completely agree. The narrow bridge on DFH by Green Road is due to be replaced as it has reached its useful life. The plan was to widen the bridge and allow for safe turning into Green Road. I have a number of outstanding questions which AT are yet to answer.

The missing central island and give way sign at the intersection of DFH and Kahikatea Flat Road will be replaced next week.

On another note, the roundabout at the intersection of DFH and Coatesville Riverhead highway is now scheduled for completion in September 2020. This slight delay is a result of the ground conditions for one of the retaining walls being unstable due to a historic landslide. An alternative design for the retaining wall has now been developed. In case you are wondering, the big steel structure at this intersection is not part of the project and is being built by the adjacent landowner on private property. I must admit the construction team were working hard on this project over the holiday period.

Safety improvements are about to start at the intersection of DFH and Potter's Road. Included in this work is a new median strip barrier and shortening of the passing lanes. Good news, the Local Board is going to fund the safety improvements outside of Dairy Flat School on DFH. This includes a new footpath and islands to make motorists aware that they are approaching a school.

Local Board Plan:

One of the guiding documents for the Local Board is the three-year Local Board Plan. This plan outlines the communities' priorities and preferences. It also guides all local board activity, funding and investment decisions.

We will soon be asking you the community for feedback on what your priorities are for the next three years. If you want to see projects get funding, it is very important to make submissions for this plan. On the 1st of March, the Local Board will be at the Coatesville Market and it would be great to see you there and hear your priorities for our community. You will also be able to provide feedback online and I will provide a link when this is available.

Structure Plan for the Dairy Flat Business/Industrial area.

Council Planners have almost completed work on the final structure plan for the new Dairy Flat business/industrial area. This includes an alternative option for delivering water and wastewater infrastructure to the structure plan area and more detailed work on the develop ability of the land for industry. Following the adoption of the final structure plan, Council will begin work on preparing a plan change, to change the zone from future urban to a new business area in the Auckland Unitary Plan. During the process residents will be able to make written submissions and present to an independent hearing panel about the proposed changes.

In the interim, I am concerned about the number of resource applications been lodged in Dairy Flat for industrial type activities. There have been three new applications in the last month. These are all for heavy machinery depots and it seems that they only need to have a loose rural connection for consent to be granted. Land within the mixed rural area is considerably cheaper than land in an industrial zone and I can see this happening more and more, resulting in Dairy Flat becoming a haphazard industrial area. Personally, I believe that the definition of what is a rural activity within the unitary plan does need to change.

Dairy Flat residents and ratepayers meeting:

I am still awaiting the appointment of an independent facilitator to help start and guide the setup of a Dairy Flat Residents and Ratepayers group.
