Redvale Landfill

Hi from the team at Waste Management,

At the start of 2018, Landfill Operations continued to fill towards the southern end of the landfill to bring levels in that area up to match the upper level of RL105. This enabled us during the winter and wetter months to keep a tight operation to assist with odour and traffic management. Due to the high volume of contaminated soils during the that time we opened up a separate tipping area which helped with any congestion at the tip face and also enabled us to separate inorganic non methane producing waste from the organic waste, to establish better control of gas capture. In July we entered our new cell19b, and this is the area we will be filling for the rest of the year, and into 2019. With summer coming this also means the building and development projects around Auckland will soon return to full swing. We will be establishing a second area for the soil trucks to tip which should be open mid-November. Regional projects of significance that Redvale Landfill is assisting with include work with Housing Corporation to renew their housing stock; development of the Northern Corridor from Constellation Drive to Albany to improve access to this part of Auckland for both cars and buses; the City Rail Link which will improve commuter rail capacity; and the Puhoi to Warkworth project which will provide a safer and more effective corridor to and from Warkworth. Our construction department are starting to get ready for this year's construction season, kicking off in October. This season we are finishing off the northern part of 19b for hand over to Operations in November. This will be the area we will use for the soil trucks. Once this cell is completed, the focus will be on the construction of another cell, cell 20a for handover in April 2019.

Our Energy Park has also seen lots of activity during 2018 with the expansion of our gas management system. This includes an additional new large gas blower, a second gas vacuum connection from the landfill into the Energy Park and a larger diameter vacuum manifold. This will ensure we have increased vacuum going into 2019 as we pull over 36 million cubic meters of methane off per year. Also in the Energy Park we are busy installing an additional 2 new Jenbacher gas generators which will see our fleet increase to 14, enabling us to supply 14,000 homes worth of electricity into the local grid.

We still have vacancies in the Landfill and Maintenance Team and if anyone is interested to find out more, please drop by or phone Stephanie at reception, 09 427 0600

Imagine being buried with your 'music' still in you?

Honestly, deep down do you believe that you might have *unfulfilled potential?* While writing of her father, author Florence Littauer told how he had always wanted to be a singer. But he never was. She says 'he died with the music still inside him'.

This message had a huge impact on my own life.

Although a quiet person, I built my first health club in 1981. With savings of only \$850 and almost immediate rent of \$550 a week, plus the fit-out to pay for, no accountant would have validated the risk. Although the ride was rough and the learning steep, the business prevailed even though I remained that 'quiet and consciences person formerly quoted on all of my school reports. At the time I was even too shy to hold a staff meeting. I came across a book that encouraged me to 'think outside the box'. It described creating a brand and systems that could be duplicated. This fired my imagination but with it came the fear that, if I grew the business to other locations, I would also have a team that I would need to speak in front of. As I wrestled with this dilemma I thought about the man who was 'buried with his music still in him'. In fact I began to fear passing-by this ambition through lack of confidence speaking in front of others. I knew I had to do something about it, if we were to grow our company.

So I joined Dale Carnegie. The first session was in a room upstairs in the Auckland Town Hall. Thirty or more nervous, mostly young adults sat around the edges of the room not speaking. It was then that Neville Booth asked each of us to stand and state our name. With my knees knocking I couldn't get that over fast enough. But I persisted with the course and followed up by attending four subsequent courses as a 'graduate assistant' in a row.

I began to have the confidence to hold meetings and to speak in front of my team. And with the support of my new partner in life, Tina, our business began to grow to become the largest health club organisation in New Zealand by the mid 1990-2000's. There were over three hundred staff by then and we held training and motivational workshops throughout the year.

During this growth I sought out an organisation who could help me to maintain confidence and to grow further. Toastmasters was recommended by several. So I joined the brand new Norwest Toastmasters, then at Hobsonville and later founded a new club within our own New Lynn gym.

More recently, Tina and I were inspired to begin a new club for the people of Dairy Flat.

Attending Toastmasters can be compared to going to the gym to maintain your health, to grow fitter, stronger and to lose weight. It's not something you do to get a result, but then quit and never need it again. It's the same as a 'workout'. You need that weekly/bi-weekly tune-up to sharpen your level of confidence and to keep your mind in shape.

You need it to be able to express your opinion in a manner that you will be listened to. And you also gain the insight of how to become a better 'listener'. When you do, it is amazing the amount of pleasure and the wisdom you pick up. There are a lot of interesting people in our community.

I hope that I have inspired you today to give **Dairy Flat Toastmasters** a try. There's a club right here in your area. It meets fortnightly in Dairy Flat Hall. Do come along as a guest and make doubly sure that we all hear the beautiful 'music' deep inside of YOU.

Update from Louise Johnston - Rodney Local Board

This last quarter has been a busy time for Dairy Flat. We are finally making progress on our key projects.

In September, Auckland Transport (AT) presented to the Local Board, the new Dairy Flat Highway (DFH) safety improvements together with the timeline for delivery. Included in the presentation was the design of the new roundabout at the intersection of Coatesville Riverhead Highway and DFH. Construction of the roundabout is still scheduled to start this year. The other improvements along DFH include new right hand turning lanes at a number of key intersections and moving bus stops to safer locations. I know that locals have been asking for these improvements for years and it is good to see that AT are finally listening and making actual improvements. AT will hold a drop-in information session in October about the upcoming safety improvements. The date and time is still to be confirmed. I have received a number of emails querying why Auckland Transport is only reviewing the speed limit of DFH and not the surrounding roads, especially the 100 km/hr speed limits at Green Road and Horseshoe Bush Road. The reason is that the Dairy Flat Highway safety project was brought forward to this year because of the community petition. However, I do believe that these roads need to be given priority by AT. So please make sure you log your safety concerns with AT via the below link and I will continue to push AT from my side.

The feedback on the activities and spaces that the community would like to see in our new 154 Hectare park and sports fields at Green Road, Dairy Flat has now closed. There was a fantastic turn out at the open day held by Council at the Dairy Flat Hall. Council said that they have received some really in depth quality feedback.

I personally think that if we can open up a number of trails in the new park for cycling, running and horse riding in the short term this will be a big win for the community. The area is massive and is twice the size of the Auckland Domain.

Lastly, the Greenways plans for Dairy Flat, Coatesville and Wainui are currently out for review. Greenways are a network of multiuse pathways for cycling, horse riding and walking Please make sure you mark out any routes that you would like in the online feedback forms (Link below). Feedback closes on the 14th of October.
