CHAIRMANS REPORT: March 2018

The Community Liaison Committee had its first meeting for 2018 on 12 March.

Highlights of that meeting are:

- The pile of tyres being held at Waste Management basically complete. Waste
 Management has systems and procedures in place in the unlikely event of a fire
 in the tyres.
- An independent review of odour generation was completed by Aecom, and distributed to CLC members. If anyone wishes to see this report I can forward a copy if an email address is supplied.
- While the report gave Waste Management a relatively clean bill of health, the
 complaints register submitted at the meeting contained four pages of odour
 complaints. One member of the committee questioned the report based on daily
 observation of odour, especially along the Richards Road side of the landfill. It is
 interesting to note that all complaints in the previous period were odour related,
 with no noise complaints tabled at all.
- Waste Management plans now call for the addition of two more generators in quarter 4 of 2018. A consultant is working on the possible need for some additional noise barriers for the additional generators.

The year five and six students have been sailing at Manly Beach and a trip to the VOLVO village in the city was a great experience.

Students have also participated in Swimming and our inter-school Swim team are busy training for the competition later in the month.

We have been learning about communities and our Oceans this term and this has been very exciting. Our students are particularly concerned about the amount of plastic in our oceans. Students are looking at how plastic is affecting life in the ocean and what we can do about it.

We look forward to continuing our learning this year.

Autumn is Planting Season

What a summer, a bit of everything in very close succession!! Now we have had good soaking rain and things are looking lush, but don't rest on your laurels as those weed seeds are putting on a spurt. Planting season is upon us with the soil moist enough to work and still warm making it ideal for plant growth and nutrient uptake. It can change from moist to inaccessible in a very short time frame.

Plants that were growing at the edge of their comfort zone may have succumbed and require replacing. Prune back dead limbs and dig out dead plants.

Get mulch delivered as close to sites as possible for later use if required.

Weeds need controlling; try not to let their seeds ripen.

Fences; stock will have been putting pressure on fences with the poor grass growth and the huge cracks in the ground, so sort them out.

Remember:

- Access is great; much easier than carrying things long distances. Especially important to those with heavy soils that rapidly saturate and pug; impeding vehicular access.
- Warm weather provides a great opportunity to hit those weeds while they are still growing actively and are more susceptible to herbicide.
- Prepare your planting sites by spot spraying or hand clearing prior to planting.

Rats, mice, rabbits, possum are active so targeting them now is a good idea, if using poison you may get mustelids as a secondary kill.

Time for you to assess your past plantings, introducing a wider range of species and infilling those areas that have got insufficient coverage. Remember every site has variations within it that will require different species. Adverse seasons highlight pockets with different attributes causing species that were only tolerating the spot they were in to suffer and possibly die. Griselinia littoralis hedges are a classic for showing this up.
